The Wisconsin Historical Society Library and Archives is the North American Library for the University of Wisconsin – Madison. While we specialize in North American history, we assist in all kinds of research. One benefit to visiting is access to hundreds of subscription databases for free. Come research with us!

#### Perform the following pre-visit steps:

The Wisconsin Historical Society Library and Archive is resource-rich! We ask students come prepared to make the most out of their time.

- 1. Visit library.wisc.edu this is the home search page
- 2. Make sure students search within: "Wisconsin Historical Society Library" and "Wisconsin Historical Society Archives"
- 3. Get familiar with call numbers, searching features, filtering, where to find citation information, etc. Watch these online tutorial videos!
- 4. Distribute copies of our "WHS Research Guide" to students to start tracking sources
- 5. If topic is outside North America, identify key databases to search on site.

#### Contact us as early as possible with a few dates that work for you. We need a DATE minimum of two weeks notice. Things to keep in mind: ⇒ Open year round except State holidays $\Rightarrow$ Limited space during UW finals (Mid December and Late April) We suggest at least three hours to get the most out of your visit. TIME Things to keep in mind: $\Rightarrow$ We give brief orientations to using the library and archives $\Rightarrow$ There is some material staff must retrieve upon arrival; takes time to sort through $\Rightarrow$ Feel free to break for lunch at the Union (WHS does not have lunch facilities) Maximum group size 45 students\* \*Two chaperones required for groups 20+ (recommended for all groups) SIZE Please send a list of narrow research topics no later than 2 weeks prior to your visit so our staff can pull archival materials. Topics should be as specific as possible so we TOPICS can help students be focused and successful. Narrowing Example: "Civil Rights Movement" to "1961 Freedom Summer" We highly recommend students bring a laptop, tablet, or smart phone (along with a



flash drive) to help with searching and saving. With a limited supply of public-use computers in the library, we cannot guarantee students will have access.

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
